News Report

"A Gallant Death"

Mr and Mrs J.C. Brodey, "Oakleigh," Grosvenor Street, Liscard have received the very sad news that their elder son, Sergt. Andrew Brodey, was killed in action on August 3rd, in his 22nd year. He joined up in October, 1914, with the Cheshire Yeomanry, attached to the King's Shropshire Light Infantry. He was drafted to Egypt in March, 1916, then to Palestine, and afterwards to France. He was expected home in a fortnight's time to undergo his studies in training for his commission. The brave soldier was educated at the Wallasey Grammar School, and previous to enlistment was in the service Messrs. Midwood and Co., cotton brokers, Liverpool, by whom he was held in in the highest esteem. He was an old choir boy of St. Paul's Church, Seacombe, where his father had been associated with the choir for very many years. Sergt. Brodey was also a Sunday School teacher, and took an active interest in the work of the Church of England Men's Society. He was a musician of very promising attainments, and studied the organ under Mr. Edward Watson (organist of West Derby Parish

Church). A keen sportsman, he played football for the Wallasey Grammar School, and was an expert swimmer. Widespread sympathy has been extended to Mr and Mrs Brodey in the loss of their son.
