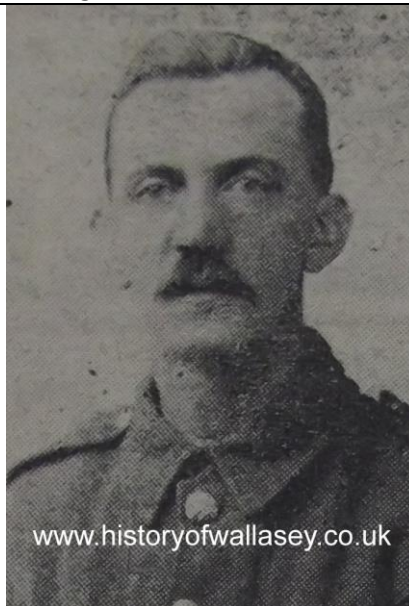

News Report

Killed On Outpost Duty

Mrs Hannah, of 68 Littledale Road, Egremont, has been notified of the death of her eldest son Private William James Hannah, on or about September 29th, in the heavy fighting at Cambrai. Whilst on outpost duty, a shell exploded, and killed him with two of his comrades. Private Hannah joined up with the Liverpool "Pals" in February, 1915, and had been continuous service in France since November of the same year. He was employed with the Dock staff of the White Star Line, being highly respected by his colleagues and friends. He was a widower, and resided with his mother, and leaves a daughter to mourn his loss. Two other sons are serving with the Colours.

His Commanding Officer in a letter to Mrs Hannah, testifies to the cheerfulness and devotion with which he carried out all his duties, and the high esteem he was held by his comrades.
