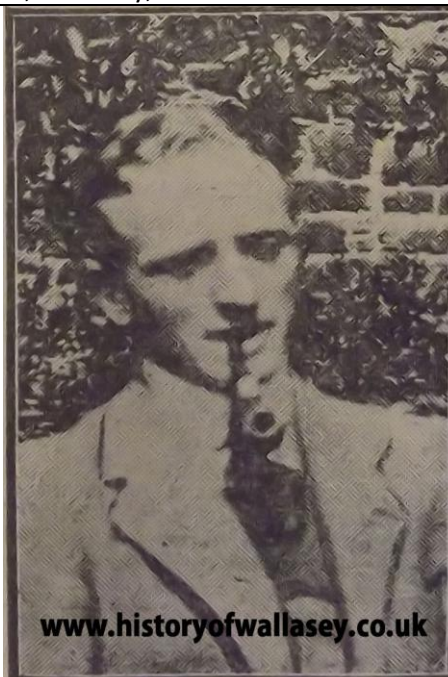

Fell On Hill 60

Among those on the 6th King's Liverpool Regiment who sacrificed their lives during the stubborn fight for "Hill 60," when our troops so valiantly upheld the traditions of the British Army was Lance-Corporal H. Lindsay Joynson, eldest son of Mr. J.H. Joynson, the well known solicitor of Wallasey and Liverpool. News has been received at the home of his parents, with whom he lived at "The Paddock", Sea Road, Wallasey, and that he was killed in action at the commencement of the fierce struggle for "Hill 60" on the 18th inst., and on the following day, when the boom of the cannon had temporarily subsided, he was interred on at the scene of the battle by his fellow comrades. Lance-Corporal Joynson, who was only 23 years of age, joined the 6th King's Liverpool Regiment, together with his brother, Raymond, at the outbreak of hostilities. He was a most popular member of his company. Indeed his pleasant and active disposition secured him a host of friends, both at the Wallasey Grammar School where he was educated and in after-life. Leaving school, he served articles with Mr. Edwin Hulme, F.I.A.,

afterwards joining the firm of Messrs. Frederic Wright and Ernest C. Eldridge.
