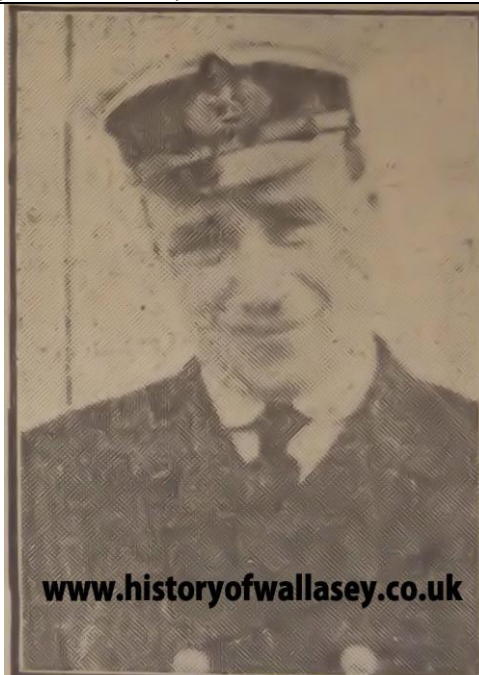

Mr. George E. Latham, of New Brighton

Among the Wallasey victims of the Lusitania outrage is Mr. George E. Latham, the second electrician of the ill-fated steamer, whose portrait is given above. Mr. Latham resided at 40, Magazine Lane, New Brighton. He was a member of a well-known Liverpool family, whose connections with the Cunard Company are long-standing, Mr. Latham was a nephew to Staff-Captain Anderson, who, as is well-known, was also lost in the disaster, so that the family has suffered a double blow. He was a fine young fellow, popular with his colleagues, and was well-known in New Brighton, where his bright disposition and musical and artistic tastes made him welcome among a wide circle of friends, he was only 29 years of age, and leaves a young widow.
