<p>Chronicle News</p> <p><u><a href="#">A Pathetic Coincidence</a></u></p> <p>The youngest son of Mr and Mrs C. Taylor, 157 Seaview Road, Liscard – Gunner Claud Bousfield Taylor, of the Tank Corps – was killed in action on August 10<sup>th</sup>. “Your son has been in my section since early in May,” wrote Second-Lieutenant Mayo, M.C., “and was always found to be ready for discharging his duties. It would be impossible for any tank commander to have found a more brave and obliging man.”</p> <p>Eighteen months ago Engineer Officer <a href="#">Charles B. Taylor</a>, met his death accidentally while on a transport. Like his brother Claud he was 24 years old when he died. A period of eighteen months elapsed between the birth of the two brothers – each being born on the 4<sup>th</sup> of the month – and a similar period elapsed between their deaths. They were both attached to the Manor Road Wesleyan Church and both attended the Sunday School. Of the two other brothers serving Liet. Engineer H.C. Taylor is in the Navy and Lieut. A.A. Taylor, M.M., and 1914 Star, is in the Royal Navy Division.</p> <p>Gunner Claud Taylor joined the Army in October. 1915, and entered the Royal Engineers. He was an assistant purser in the Elder Dempster Line.</p>
