#### Wallasey "Pals" Death

#### Funeral At Liscard

The remains of the late Private William Morris Williams, of the 11th Cheshires, who succumbed to Bright's disease in Fazakerley Military Hospital on Thursday of last week, were laid to rest at Wallasey Cemetery, Rake Lane, on Monday afternoon. Private Williams, who was thirty-three years of age, resided at 2, Silverlea Avenue, Liscard. Prior to the war he was in the employ of Mr. S. Gibbons, carriage proprietor, Liscard, and enlisted towards the end of 1914. He went to the front some months later, and was invalided home.

The ceremony was quietly conducted, there being nothing of a military nature. The mourners included Mrs. Williams (widow), Mrs. Williams (mother), Misses B and A.M. Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Parry, Private and Mr. J.W. Lee, and Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Hughes.

The last rites were impressively conducted by the Revs. R. Lloyd (Welsh Baptist Church, Liscard Road), J.W. Skinner (New Brighton Baptist Church) and J.L. Jones.

Floral tributes were sent by "His wife and son," "Mother, sisters, and brother," "Cousin Maggie," Mr. and Mrs. J. Minnis, Mr. and Mrs. Hawker, Mr. and Mrs. Gibbons, Mr. and Mrs. Lee and family, and the Seabank Road Baptist Church Flower Mission, while the sympathy of his fellow employees at Mr. Gibbons' yard was shown in an artificial wreath.

The funeral arrangements were in the hands of Mr. S. Gibbons.
