<p>News Report</p> <p><u>Wallasey Journalist's Son Killed</u></p> <p>Mr. T. Holden, of Hillside Road, Wallasey, a well-known Liverpool journalist, has suffered bereavement through the death of his son, 2nd. Lieut. Harold Holden, who has fallen in action.</p> <p>Lieut. Holden, who belonged to the Loyal North Lancashire Regt., was educated at Wallasey Grammar School, and on the conclusion of his studies joined the staff of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Company. After the outbreak of war he was first among those to answer the call, and he enlisted over two years ago. He was trained at the Inns of Court Officers' Training Corps, London, and subsequently was commissioned in the Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. Two months later Lieut. Holden was drafted to France, where he saw much fighting. He was home on leave recently, and returned to his duties</p>	

in high spirits and full of confidence. Lieut. Holden, in addition to social qualities, was a great athlete, and very popular among all his comrades. He was an active worker in connection with the Young People's Society at the Wallasey Wesleyan Church.

How Lieut. Holden Died

With regard to the death of Second-Lieutenant Harold Holden, of the Loyal North Lancs., who fell gallantly in action, his father (Mr. Thomas Holden, of Hillside Road, Wallasey) has just received from the commanding officer of the battalion a letter expressing grief at the loss of Lieutenant Holden. The C.O. adds:- "His battalion was attacking a strong point when he was hit by a shell and killed. He was a brave boy, always cheerful and willing, and I shall have difficulty in replacing him. His men were most devoted to him. Please accept my sincere sympathy."
